



Instructions¹

Each player receives 5 chips (or points) at the beginning of the game. Truth cards are distributed among the players, who can share them with the player whose turn it is if a certain one is requested. As play proceeds around the board, the player takes a card which matches the color he or she landed on and reads the question. If the answer is correct, a chip is received. If the player can incorporate a verse from a Truth card in the answer, an extra point or chip is received. (Ideas are provided regarding which verses could be used.) Green cards are true-false, yellow indicates an action response, and blue cards are for thinking about the truth in the situation. The player with the most points or chips at the end of the game is the winner.

Note: there is a PRIZE card in each color, so be prepared to provide a small prize when that card is turned over.

This game allows a client to process information from the safe perspective of another person's life (in this case a bible character). However, the therapist can also ask questions which will assist the client to apply the principle being addressed in a very personal way. Depending on the level of safety, there is much freedom to use the game as a springboard for therapeutic interventions.

Esther was a beautiful young lady who experienced great sadness at a very young age when she lost both of her parents. She was completely lost, with no one to tuck her in at night, no one to be proud of her, no one to care whether she succeeded or not, no one to provide for her. But one thing she did have – a heavenly Father who cared very much about her and the huge, empty hole that was left in the place her parents once were.

Esther's loving heavenly Father chose to provide for her an older cousin named Mordecai, who took her in and raised her as his own daughter. As far as we know, Esther still did not have a mother to nurture her and care for her, to answer her "girl questions" and do the things that mothers and daughters do. But she was grateful for this man, who cared very much for her. He too knew sorrow, for his people had been forced to leave their homes and travel to Babylon to live in captivity. He had experienced extreme prejudice and unfair treatment because of his race. When Esther was teased or mistreated, he knew how to help her understand how valuable she was and to keep a respectful attitude. Esther had every reason to be bitter, but instead chose to listen to her new father and to carefully obey everything he asked of her.

In the place of captivity where they lived, Mordecai and Esther were ruled by an evil king named Xerxes. This king was full of pride and very much into himself. He thought nothing of killing someone if they didn't do as he pleased. He decided to throw a huge party that lasted for months, just to show off how rich and great he was. He demanded that his beautiful wife come to the party so he could also show off how gorgeous she was, and she refused to come. This made him so mad that he had her removed and started looking for a new wife. He gathered the prettiest girls from across the land into his palace and had them go through all kinds of beauty treatments so he could pick the most beautiful one to be his new wife.

Esther was one of those lovely girls. Because she had learned growing up to seek her father's advice and follow it, she did the same in this situation. When it was her turn to see the king, she took only the things his servant who was in charge of the women recommended. She also followed her father's advice when he told her not to tell the king what her race was. She found such favor with the king that he decided to make her his queen.

Now you may think that Esther had it made now that she was a queen. But her trials were not over. There was another man named Haman who was very close to the king and was also full of pride and into himself. He was part of a group of people who had always hated the Jews. At Haman's request the king demanded that when his servants saw him they bow down to him as he walked by. Mordecai was determined to only worship God, not another person, so he wouldn't bow down to Haman. This made him so mad that he came up with a plan to get rid of Mordecai and all the Jews. He bribed the king with a large sum of money and made up a story that this people didn't follow the king's laws. He talked him into making a decree which could not be reversed that they be destroyed. Mordecai and Esther had always known discrimination, but now their entire race was to be annihilated in one day!

Mordecai told Esther to talk to the king and ask him to save her people. But there was one problem. Because he was so into himself, if anybody (including his wife) came to see him without him deciding first that he wanted to see them, they could be killed right on the spot. Esther knew she would be taking her life into her hands to even try to talk to him, because he hadn't requested to see her for a long time. She knew she couldn't do it alone, so she asked Mordecai and all her people to fast and pray for her for three days, while she and her servants did the same. God gave her courage and a plan for how to approach the king. When she asked to see him, he extended his golden scepter, indicating she had his favor. She invited him and Haman to a big banquet rather than barging in with her request right away. The king was ready to give her anything she wanted, up to half the kingdom, but she still waited with her request. She invited them to another banquet the next night. By that time a series of events had occurred that made the timing of her request absolutely perfect. (You can read the book of Esther if you want the details!) Because Esther had obeyed Mordecai and had not told him she was a Jew, when she exposed Haman's evil scheme to get rid of the Jews and told him they were her people, he was very angry with Haman. God had prepared the king's heart and he not only granted her request to save her people, but got rid of Haman and all his family and put Mordecai in charge in his place! Though he could not reverse the evil decree to attack the Jews, he allowed Mordecai to make another decree that the Jews could protect themselves and in the end the Jews won the battle hands down! Once again, Esther's respectful, obedient attitude in the midst of great unfairness paid off, not only for her but for her entire people.

Tamar Story (2 Samuel 13)

Tamar was a very beautiful young lady who was obedient and had a pure heart. She had a half brother named Amnon who lived in a different house and had a different mother. Amnon noticed how beautiful she was and decided he wanted to have sex with her. He was frustrated that he couldn't figure out a way to make this happen, and actually became depressed and sick. His cousin noticed and asked what was wrong. When he understood, he came up with a plan for Amnon where he could manipulate her into a position where he could take advantage of her. The plan was to pretend that he was sick and ask his father to send Tamar to take care of him. She came to his house and made him some food, but he refused to eat it. He demanded that everyone else leave and that she bring the food to his bedroom. Once she was in his room, he asked her to get in bed with him. She said no, it would be a disgrace for her to violate her that way. She explained that she could never get rid of her shame and he would be acting in a way that was stupid, degrading, and disgustingly bad. She pleaded with him to do it the right way, to ask her dad if he could marry her. But instead of making a responsible choice, he forced himself on her. She couldn't resist because he was stronger. After using her, he decided he didn't really love her; he hated her, and sent her away. When she told him this was even worse, he wouldn't listen to her, had her thrown out, and locked the door behind her. (In those days, this meant she would not have the opportunity to get married, because men wanted only virgins.) She left in tears, and when her brother Absalom realized what had happened to her, he told her to keep quiet about it and not to take it to heart. She continued to live a lonely life in Absalom's house after that. Her dad and brother were very angry about it. Her dad didn't want to do anything because he loved Amnon and he was his oldest son. Absalom refused to speak to Amnon and eventually killed him to get revenge.
